Prompt: Choose a category that you can divide and classify into at least three or four categories (representing at least four body paragraphs). Possibilities for division and classification are groups of high school students, breeds of dogs, members of a typical American family, sorts of people, kinds of video games, types of friends, species of plants or animals, types of cars, categories of teachers, types of colleges, ways of reacting to setbacks, ways of impressing a potential boyfriend / girlfriend, ways of responding to stress, ways of breaking up with your boyfriend / girlfriend. There are millions more you could think up! Basically, don't choose anything that you could easily just look up on the Internet. Put your own unique, imaginative spin on this topic. The ones is blue are ostensibly more complex.

1. Writing Skills = 25 points

- Are the subjects divided logically into at least three categories that are both clear, mutually exclusive, and covers the total range of your topic.
- Does the writer include one or two sentences per body paragraph that effectively describe the distinguishing characteristics of each classification?
- To what extent is the writing clear of distracting errors in mechanics, usage, spelling, and grammar?

COMPOUND-COMPLEX: Highlight in green and label via the comments section four different types of compound-complex sentences in any of the following structural formats:

- ★ DC, IC, coordinating conjunction IC.
- ★ DC, IC; conjunct, IC.
- ★ IC DC, coordinating conjunction IC.
- ★ IC DC; conjunct, IC.
- ★ IC, coordinating conjunction DC, IC.
- ★ IC; conjunct, DC, IC.
- ★ IC, coordinating conjunction IC DC.
- ★ IC; conjunct, IC DC.
